Ideally, participants develop their own research questions and designs on questions of federalism, decentralisation or multi-level governance while attending the course.

- complete assigned readings according to schedule
- hand in one research paper of about 15 pages or two research essays of about 7 to 8 pages in length on 10 March 2019 at the latest (late assignments will be penalized, unless prior arrangements are made!). You are free to hand in individual research papers or group research papers.
