

## **Research Project: Types of Democracy**

In this seminar-style research project we ask two questions: (1) Why do democracies vary in the way they are institutionalized? (2) What are the consequences of these variations for actor constellations, political processes and the performance of political systems? Empirical research in this area makes use of typologies, which are not just descriptive but can be used as starting points for generating theory.

Types of democracies refers to specific institutional constellations. These types need to be distinguished from modes of democracy. These refer to specific ways to come to decisions such as representative, direct, deliberative, liquid democracy etc. Our focus lies on types of democracy but we also try to cover some aspects related to modes of democracy.

Ideally, this research project should help participants come up with first ideas for a Master Thesis.

Students are expected to:

- attend sessions regularly and hand in two questions on the assigned readings via Email on the day before the session takes place until 12:00h (Email: [ee@mpifg.de](mailto:ee@mpifg.de)),
- actively contribute to classroom discussions (oral presentations, written questions on assigned readings, group work),
